BEACHES

CALA MILLOR

Cala Millor Beach is more than two kilometres long and has an average width of 50 metres and a slope of 4%. Its sand is fine and clean and its waters crystalline and blue.

Its modern infrastructure and the meticulous care taken of it have contributed to it being awarded the European Community Blue Flag for the past seven years. The Blue Flag is an emblem granted annually by the European Foundation for Environmental Educational to beaches and ports that meet a series of conditions concerning the environment and the facilities provided.

It has a first aid post, toilets and showers and wheelchair access.

A wide variety of water sports is available from June to September.

CALA BONA

Cala Bona Beach is 550 metres long and 9 metres wide. It is an uncrowded stone and sand beach divided into three parts by small breakwaters. It has a first aid post and is near the fishing harbour where you will find a wide variety of restaurants.

Also near Cala Bona is the attractive small beach of Sa Punta Roja (between Cala Bona harbour and Port Verd).

This beach is certified with the AENOR Certificate for Universal Accessibility, in accordance with the UNE 170001 standard. We have an amphibious wheelchair service and special equipment for disabled persons, as well as staff to assist you and reserved parking spaces, toilets, showers and wheelchair access.

COSTA DELS PINS:

On the way to Costa dels Pins you will find some picturesque small coves that are ideal if you are looking for a more peaceful spot away from the crowds. These are the beaches of Port Verd, Port Nou and Port Vell, Sa Marjal, Es Ribell and Es Ratioli.

Sa Marjal

Sa Marjal Beach is known for its charm and tranquillity thanks to its location farther away from the town. It is a long, narrow beach of fine, greyish-coloured sand resulting from the accumulation of the organic remains of seagrass. It has a car park, a restaurant, sun lounger hire, a first aid post, showers and wheelchair access.

Es Ribell

Es Ribell is a small beach with crystalline waters that allow you to see the seabed.

It is frequented by celebrities and hundreds of anonymous bathers and is popular with yacht owners who anchor off the beach for a few hours.

Es Ratjolí

A small sand and stone cove with very clean waters and natural shade. It is 77 m long and 8 m wide and access is via steps.

SA COMA:

This beach of fine white sand is 800 me-

tres long and 30 metres wide. Its blue, crystalline waters and range of water sports make it popular with both locals and holidaymakers. It has the EU Blue Flag, public toilets, wheelchair access and other services for bathers.

S'ILLOT:

S'Illot is a small bay also known as "Cala Moreia" into which the Torrent de n'Amer flows. It has 350 metres of sands that slope gently into the sea. The beach

has a boardwalk for wheelchair access and a water sports zone.

ROUTE

In addition to sun and beaches, Cala Millor offers its visitors many other leisure and entertainment activities.

Its 20 kilometres of fairly flat terrain make it ideal for cycling. There are cycle lanes from Sa Coma to Costa dels Pins and from there you have the option of continuing to Son Servera.



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CALA MILLOR

Sa Punta de n'Amer (Cala Millor - Sa Coma)

This nature reserve on private land was declared a Natural Area of Special Interest (ANEI) in 1985. Located between the residential areas of Cala Millor and Sa Coma, it covers some 200 hectares of great natural, cultural and historic value. Sa Punta de n'Amer is particularly interesting for its flora and fauna; dune, scrub, pine grove and rock communities all coexist here. It is also home to some of the endemic species of the Balearic Islands.

It is a recommended hiking area. Museum and bar-restaurant open all year.

"Es Castell" Defensive Tower (Cala Millor – Sa Coma)

Also known as "Es Castell" (the Castle), this defensive tower is in the Sa Punta de n'Amer Natural Area of Special Interest, between Cala Millor and Sa Coma. It was built in the 17th century to guard the coast between the neighbouring towers of Porto Cristo and Cap Roig and was part of the defensive system that surrounded Mallorca at a time when pirates often attacked the island to steal food and valuables and kidnap people.

Museum open all year.

"Sa Màniga" Auditorium

A cultural centre with a select repertoire of performances from the scenic and musical arts. It has an exhibition room, a large hall and various conference rooms with different capacities for congresses and conventions.

Take the Cala Millor - Costa dels Pins road until you come to Avinguda del Pinar.

S'ILLOT

Prehistoric Settlement of S'Illot

Its long and complex historical evolution and the variety of its monuments make this one of the most important Talayotic and post-Talayotic (850 - 123 BC) archaeological sites.

The S'Illot Talayotic Settlement Visitor Centre is designed to introduce the visitor to the world of prehistory and the pre-Talayotic culture. It shows you the people of Mallorca from that time, how they lived and their customs and other characteristics.

SON SERVERA:

Church of Sant Joan Baptista

This church is dedicated to John the Baptist, the town's patron saint, and is in the Plaça de Sant Joan. Work on it began in 1622. It has a rectangular ground plan with a single nave and side chapels and is particularly interesting for the defensive tower built over the presbytery, now used as the bell tower.

It can be visited free of charge on Friday mornings, coinciding with the weekly street market.

Església Nova (New Church)

The Catalan architect Joan Rubió Bellver, who worked with the world-famous Antoni Gaudí, was commissioned to design this emblematic church in the municipality of Son Servera, although after several changes had been made, it was finally left unfinished. Today we can see elements of Neo-Gothic architecture —a marked austerity, large windows and rose windows— and a particularly magical effect due to it being open to the sky.

"Pastoret" Statue – Son Servera Epidemic

In the year 1820 a crew member from a vessel that had set sail from Tangier died in strange circumstances. His body was abandoned on our coast. A passing peasant decided to take the cape covering the dead man to protect himself from the damp night air. He died the next day and along with him many of the residents of Son Servera. In a short time 1,040 people out of a total population of 1,808 were dead.

The 768 survivors made a huge effort to rebuild the town socially.

The "Pastoret" or "Little Shepherd", a sculpture by Eduardo Servera in the Plaça Sant Joan (next to the church), pays homage to the survivors.

Es Rentadors (the Washhouse)

A public washhouse built in 1905 by the provincial architect Juan Guasp, thanks to the collaboration of Pedro Orlandis, who donated a thousand pesetas to the town so that it could be built and provide the ideal place for the serverins and serverines to do the laundry. It is a rectangular roofed space with washing basins and limestone sinks in the middle. It has recently been restored by the Town Council as part of Son Servera's historical heritage.

SANT LLORENÇ DES CARDASSAR:

Parish Church of Sant Llorenç des Cardassar

This church is first documented in a papal bull issued in the 13th century by Pope Innocent IV in which it is referred to as the church of Santa María de Bellver. The present-day place of worship was granted a royal licence in 1360. Since then it has been extended and refurbished several times, the last being in 1992, when the interior was restored. Carrer Rector Pascual, 1.

The church can be visited on Thursdays, coinciding with the weekly street market.

SON CARRIÓ:

Son Carrió Church

Construction of the Catholic church of Sant Miquel began in 1899 based on plans sketched out by Monsignor Antoni María Alcover, revised by Joan Guasp and slightly modified by the famous Catalan architects Antonio Gaudí and Joan Rubió. It was inaugurated in 1907 and its most outstanding features are the Neo-Romanesque-style façade, the row of balconies with terrace, the fanshaped rose window and the four-storey bell tower.

The church is in the main square and is open on Saturday mornings from 11:00 to 13:00.
